



## Dr. James Guy Hollandsworth Jr.

January 7, 1944 - September 21, 2010

Asheville- Dr. James G. Hollandsworth, Jr. died Tuesday, September 21, 2010 at his home. He was the son of James G. and Willie Lee Hearn Hollandsworth. He graduated from Asheville School, Davidson College, and received his masters and doctorate degrees from University of North Carolina University, Chapel Hill, and did post graduate work at Madeline College, Oxford University. England. He was a professor and administrator at the University of Southern Mississippi. Hattiesburg, MS. He was the author of many publications and books on psychology and Civil War history and was active in many historical associations. He enjoyed climbing and hiking in Wyoming Mountains with his father. He retired recently and moved to Asheville, NC. He is survived by his father, James .G. Hollandsworth and wife Marjorie of Huntington. WV and Black Mountain, NC. and by his former wife and best friend, Susan Hollandsworth of Jackson, MS and by his dog Buddy.
