November 9, 1913 - September 16, 2013

Louise Manget Cate of Atlanta died peacefully at Brooks-Howell Home on September 16, 2013. Louise was born in 1913 in Huchow, China to Dr. Fred P. and Louise Manget, who were in China to establish a hospital. Louise attended the Shanghai American School and graduated from Oberlin Conservatory of Music in 1937. She was teaching piano to Chinese students in Shanghai at the time of the Japanese Invasion of WWII. After leaving China, she taught music in private schools in New York and North Carolina. Louise then moved to Atlanta to work for the American Red Cross and contribute to the war effort. During this time she met her future husband and they married in 1944 at St Luke's Episcopal Church, which became their church home. Louise later continued her career as a teacher and music therapist. In her retirement, she used her skills for the benefit of various charity groups, playing piano and leading singing. Louise was predeceased by her husband Thomas Marshall Cate, their son Thomas M. Cate, Jr., and three sisters, Elizabeth Minter, Jean Seahorn, and Mildred Manget. She is survived by her daughter Louise Latimer Cate (Tom Wernicke) of Asheville and granddaughter Amanda Cate Wernicke of Arlington, VA. As a person of deep faith, Louise pondered what makes life significant; she concluded that personal connections, communication, and kindness are of utmost importance and shared this message with caregivers, friends, and family.
